1.1 Numbers

Saying and writing numbers

Most people working in finance, whether it is in accountancy, banking, investing, trading, etc., spend a lot of time dealing with numbers. Understanding and saying long numbers or figures in a foreign language can be difficult and generally requires practice.

1 Hundreds, thousands, millions, etc.

(Alternatively, 1,000,000 is 10⁶ – ten to the power six; 1,000,000,000 is 10⁹ – ten to the power nine, etc.) Notice that English uses a **comma** to separate large numbers into groups of three digits, counting from the right.

English does **not** use a raised comma (1'000'000).

2 A British / American difference

In British English, people say 'and' after the hundred, in American English they do not. (In fact the 'and' is very short, and usually sounds like an 'n', like in rock'n'roll or fish'n'chips.)

3 Numbers and years

The **number** 1,999 is said: one thousand, nine hundred (and) ninety-nine. The **year** 1999 is said: nineteen ninety-nine.
